

Who will the City build the park for?

Bonnie Brae Park is just one of the 17 parks and recreation facilities we have in Temple Terrace. Following is a quote from the City's web page located at http://www.templeterrace.com/parks_recreation/index.htm :

“The Parks and Recreation Department prides itself on maintaining the highest levels of service with regard to leisure based programs and facilities. Overall, the 100 full and part-time personnel of the department manage **360** acres of land throughout the city including 2 community based recreation centers, 3 athletic facilities, 5 community parks, 5 neighborhood parks, 3 tennis facilities, 5 swimming pools, and 3 nature preserves.”

BONNIE BRAE PARK (2.5 acres)

Bonnie Brae Blvd., south of Druid Hills



This neighborhood park is equipped with a dinosaur themed playground, sand volleyball, basketball court, and picnic shelters. The park has become quite popular for playgroups and picnics. Bonnie Brae Park has been adopted by the Temple Terrace Junior Woman's Club.

If the City cannot control the use of an exemplary resource such as the Bonnie Brae Park, how will it control users of the planned walkable project with green spaces and the riverside park adjacent to the project?

Will the expenditure of our tax dollars build these amenities for non-residents?
